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Editor's Note

Reflections on Ahmet Hamdi Tanpınar's *Time Regulation Institute* and Little Truths as to A Comprehensive 'Table of Contents'

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The Turkish novel represents the historical depth, cultural diversity and individual sensitivity of Turkish society and Turkish people. It presents the elements of underlying transgenerational trauma between East and West even in the modernist and postmodernist texts. The individual talent of every Turkish novelist manifests itself upon such tradition punctuated with the traces of change through the transitional periods from the past to the present. Tanpınar's *Time Regulation Institute* (1954), in this context, is a remarkable narrative text exploring the conflict between the traditional and the modern as well as the historical and the fictional. However, it deals with these issues in a literarily modernist fashion, yet with somewhat postmodernist implications, and produces textual and meta-textual discourses. Tanpınar, as a historical and implied author, does not only represent the clocks and watches, as the signs of traditional and modern perceptions of time but also problematizes the issue of storytelling and representation.

The Time Regulation Institute can be regarded as a critical account of modernisation. The novel criticises empty westernisation, as was the case with the themes explored in Evelyn Waugh's Black Mischief, yet from a different perspective, and calls into question the Republican reforms regarding their internalisation. The established bureaucracy tracing back to the Ottoman era and cultural codes governing the solid or abstract institutions since then are explored in the novel along with the changing society all through the changing periods from the late 19th century to the early 20th century. The novel, therefore, covers a long time from the late Ottoman Era towards the early Republican period with considerations of the aspects of modernisation amalgamated with the political and historical inclinations towards the so-called change. More importantly, Tanpınar, I suppose, raises critical questions as to history-making and history-writing. Because of the richness

and profundity of the aspects in the narrative, a critical enquiry into the transformation of Turkish literary and historical experience deserves a greater recognition from the researchers of various disciplines.
